





graduate students.






Countries with Growth

- Visa access and denial rates

- University budget constraints
- Market volatility and student ability to pay
- Unpredictable global economy
- Strength of the USD

Institutional

- English Proficiency lingering COVID impact
- Shifts in international curriculums
- Heightened focus on rankings in cluttered landscape

an all-time high.




- High context vs low context cultures
